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Subject: Climate Change and the Role of Midwifery Associations

Background:

The impacts of climate change have begun and will continue now regardless of mitigation strategies moving forward.¹ In Canada, we have already begun to experience the impacts of climate change including reduced air quality, melting ice, rising waters and extreme weather events.²

Climate change threatens the social and environmental determinants of health.³ The climate crisis is therefore also a public health crisis.⁴ At a federal level the health impacts of climate change on Canadians have been considered since at least 2008.⁵ The Public Health Agency of Canada has prepared several fact sheets to help Canadians understand the health associated risks of climate change.⁶

Health care providers need to be aware of the health impacts of climate change in order to best meet the needs of the populations that they serve. The possible future health impacts for our midwifery families are varied and

include spontaneous abortion, low birth weight, premature delivery, increased neonatal mortality, food insecurity, vector-borne diseases, and respiratory disease.⁷

There are no statements on climate change or policy directives from the Midwifery profession in Canada. However, midwives from around the world are engaged in addressing the impacts of climate change and promoting sustainable strategies.¹⁶ In addition, Midwifery was absent from the recent call to action on climate change and health jointly put out by the Canadian Association of Physicians for the Environment (CAPE), the Canadian Medical Association (CMA), the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA), the Canadian Public Health Association (CPHA) and the Urban Public Health Network (UPHN).¹⁷

Whereas midwives around the world are playing a role in education and advocacy related to health and climate change;

Whereas other associations both nationally and internationally have produced statements related to the health impacts of climate change and have taken a role in preparing their members to address these impacts;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT

The Canadian Association of Midwives commit to exploring both internal and external opportunities to play a role in climate change mitigation and adaption in such areas as organizational best practice; education of members and the public; research on the impacts of climate change on perinatal and newborn health; and political advocacy.

Expected implications:

The four pillars of midwifery – Education, Regulation, Association and Research – will need to strengthen their approaches in integrating knowledge, skills and values taking climate change in to account.
